The first step in delivering a successful improvement

project is to ensure you have a skilled improvement team.

KQuIP has developed an essential QI toolkit with the aim of:

- Building confidence and leadership skills
- Sustainability




Fig. 1 IHI Model for Improvement

The KQuIP essential toolkit includes three interactive workshops, using the IHI Model For improvement (Fig.1) as the framework You can view NW programme dates here

On the 8th July, the first of three workshops was delivered in the North West. It started with presentations by members of the North West multi-professional team followed by interactive sessions in two project based breakout rooms.

#### Presentation 1 — Introduction to Quality Improvement

Dr Rosie Donne, NW KQuIP medical lead, started the afternoon with an introduction to the steps of QI and what is needed to get started.

#### Rosie's key messages were:

- \* For QI to be successful, we need to use a structured approach
- Not every change is an improvement, but every improvement requires a change
- Expect people to resist change, its all part of the process.



## Presentation 2 — Stakeholder Engagement and Communication

Amanda Balshaw–Greer, NW KQuIP nurse lead, presented on how to identify project stakeholders and how to engage and communicate with them.

## Amanda's key messages were:

- \* 80% of quality improvement is about the people
- \* To motivate people to change, we need to set the fire within rather than underneath them
- By using QI tools and techniques in a methodical way, success is possible.

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**Following on from the presentations, attendees were separated into project breakout rooms for an interactive session.** These provided an opportunity to ask questions and network with other centres. The purpose of these sessions was for attendees to start thinking and planning how they will apply the QI skills and techniques to their projects. Four trusts from the region were involved, each sending one medical and one nurse to lead either home therapies or transplant first. Members of the Renal Patient Led Advisory Network (RPLAN) also attended, ensuring the QI projects are co-produced.

## **Activity One**

Each attendee was asked to draw their signature with their non-dominant hand and discussed how this applies to QI. Here are some of the comments made.

The key message is you may feel uncomfortable making a change, but you can do it.

- Difficult and uncomfortable
- Had to think how to start
- Wrote it backwards
- I'm getting better the more I do
- It takes more effort
  - Very shaky

## **Activity Two**

Each breakout room built a process map. Although it was fun, the delegates realised it's not easy mapping out a simple process. *Key learning from the exercise included knowing where the process starts and finishes, really understanding each step, and demonstrated the need to involve the whole team to understand the full experience*.
